

# VILLAGE SCHOOL MAY CLOSE?


The news that the Local Education Authority is considering the possibility of closing our school came as a nasty shock to some of us, who had been hoping that with the new staff, the school would carry on playing an increasingly important part in the life of the community. I say 'some of us', because, as usual, some don't care a hoot, others assume it'll never happen, others say 'if they want to close it, we'll not be able to stop them, and others are only prepared to moan at people who assert their right to campaign on local issues.

The Consultation Meeting on February 6th is for 'parents and governors'. Not good enough. The whole community is, or should be, included in the life of a local school, and vice versa. While it has, by telephone, been agreed that parents of children soon due to attend school will be eligible to attend this meeting this still excludes, unless they are parents, members of and using the school, staff, local representatives who are not governor, and other concerned members of the community. This is why the 23rd January meeting was organised, and why some of us arranged publicity to ensure that as many people as possible in the community were aware of the Authority's proposals, rather than the information being restricted to parents of children already attending the school.

It is true that the Authority says 'No decisions have yet been taken' and describes the closure of Milford School as a 'possible plan'. However, no other 'possible plan' involving our school staying open appeared in their leaflet, and it seemed clear to us that if we didn't show our disapproval of the idea at this early stage, and prepare to struggle to protect our amenities, the plan might well be pushed through

It's no good waiting for a decision to be taken before opposing it. If our school is to stay open, we must all, parents and non-parents alike, inform ourselves about the issues, and let the education authorities, members of the education committee, school govenors and our local representatives know how we feel.

Our constitution states that officers - Chairperson, Treasurer and Secretary - cannot serve more than three consecutive years. The present Chairman and Secretary must resign at the Annual General Meeting at the end of March. At the moment most of the Association's energy is going into the production of this newspaper, and most of those involved are prepared to continue. Of course we have written to protest to the Director of Education, and are joining with other groups to work out how we can best make sure that the school - and the playgroup - survive.

## CAMEO MEMBERS ENJOY OUTING


On Monday 5th. December members of "Cameo" enjoyed a trip around the Tutbury Glass Factory. Afterwards tea was taken in the village Tea Shop.

# FAITH & FAMILY

We know who wants to publicly declare themselves to be part of the Christian Faith Family at Milford Parish Church by whether or not their names are on the Church's Electoral Roll. At the moment there are 59 names on the Roll at Holy Trinity. But all of them are about to be taken off! This is because every sixth year the Roll is scrapped. So at the Spring 1984 revision of the Roll no names at all are carried over from the old Roll - everyone must make a new application to be included on the new Roll. All persons who wish to have their names entered on the Milford Church Roll, whether their names have been on the old one or not, are hereby requested to fill in an application form as soon as possible. There are plenty at the back of the church. If you can't get to church during the next month or so, but still want to be on the new Roll, please ask a regular worshipper to bring you a form. You have a right to join if you are (a) Baptized, (b) 16 or over, and (c) resident in the parish OR have regularly worshipped at the Parish Church for the last 6 months.

Why have an Electoral Roll? It is a great help for the parish filing, mailing, visiting and praying system to have an up-to-date list of those who say they are members. But the legal reason for the Roll is to provide electors at the Annual Church Meeting to vote for Churchwardens, Church Council members, and representatives on the higher rungs of the Church's administrative ladder; it also colours the rate of our annual Parish Share paid to central Church funds for clergy pay etc.



The Annual Church Meeting (when all adult members of Holy Trinity are expected to be present) will be held on Monday 27th February at 7.30 pm in the Church Room.

The meeting will, in addition to the usual annual business of reports and accounts, be mainly concerned to answer questions 2 and 5 of the CHRISTIANS RESPOND questionnaire before the Archdeacon of Derby comes to us on Friday 16th March - PLEASE NOTE THAT DATE NOW.

The AIMS OF THE LOCAL CHURCH we have decided to work at on 27th February at the AGM and on 16th March with the Archdeacon are these (voted on by all who answered the questionnaire in the November edition of Treacle City):

lst: To be a healing community that cares for people in need.
