

Present Second Year Juniors will enter Strutts Middle School in September of this year, whilst First Year Juniors will continue their education at Milford when it converts to a Primary School in September 1986. The effect of becoming a Primary School is that children will remain at Milford until the August following their eleventh birthday.

# IN MILFORD



# RE-MARRIAGE YES OR NO

# OR A BLESSING IN DISGUISE

WHATEVER IS the general synod of the Church of England going to do on the issue of remarriage of divorced persons in church? A situation has arisen in which it will be all too easy for 'each-vicar-decidesfor-himself' to become the actual policy of the church — if such a chaos can be called a policy at all. Already the Bishop of Birmingham, Dr Hugh Montefiore, has given notice of an episcopal UDI on the issue within his diocese.

All this arises from a decision, as I understand it, made by the synod admitting the possibility of the remarriage of a divorced person in church with careful safeguards. It is in regard to the safeguards that the whole process has come unstuck. The first proposals were of Byzantine complexity, and were rejected with vigour. The second set of proposals emerged from the house of bishops, and were simpler. They have hardly met a warmer welcome than the first. At the time that I write towards thirty dioceses have rejected them, and a bare dozen supported them. The proposals can hardly be imposed by the synod in the face of such widespread distaste for them

Strictly there is no legal reason why any incumbent should not on his own responsibility officiate at such marriages. That position has in the past only been exploited rarely.

With the authority of the general synod (after all the supreme governing body of the church) the possibility of the re-marriage of divorced persons being solemnised has been clearly recognized. The stumbling-block has been in trying to discover an agreed set of guidelines and procedures to avoid a scene in which every incumbent does what is right in his own eyes.


The issue is a very sharp one indeed. It has been sharpened by the great growth of divorce, and by the remarkable increase in the number of divorced priests. The absolutist position sees in such increase a powerful argument for the church to refuse to be conformed to this world. There must be no accommodation to secular trends which are destructive of true marriage. The more liberal position is strong on pastoral concern, and regrets the attitudes which can alienate those who are in need of the church's understanding as they make a new commitment of partnership.

Some bishops are putting their whole energy behind a refusal of actual marriage services, but the provision of a carefully-worked out service of blessing after civil marriage. My guess is that such provision would only hold the line for a brief period, and that in any case the trappings around the service of blessing would rapidly make it indistinguishable from a marriage service.

Saturday 7th September: This morning we are manning the Charity Stall on Belper Market, so will need things (especially cakes) to sell.


Saturday 14th and Sunday 15th September will be our Harvest Festival weekend; this will include an extra evening service on the Sunday.
