

### COMPANY BACKS TREACLE CITY WITH CASH GIFT

From the outset two years ago it was agreed that the production and delivery of 'Treacle City' to every home in Milford was likely to cost more money than advertising revenue would cover. The agreement was between the Parish Church and the Residents Association - who both declared their willingness to share likely financial losses, both believing the project to be too important to be over anxious about losing money.

When this summer the Vicar could foresee the church getting a bill for its share of the deficit he decided to write to the country's largest THEACLE producer, sending Tate and Lyle two copies of 'Treacle City'. Their generous reply is reproduced in full below. The £150 will be shared equally by the Parish Church and the Residents Association, so that neither partner in this enterprise looks like having to finance any deficit for the time being; it will go into the common fund of the two partners.

Needless to say, all of us who help to produce 'Treacle City' are absolutely delighted with this help and boost to our confidence. We hope that you, the readers, will remember Tate and Lyle's generosity when you are shopping for your treacle and sugar.


I enclose a cheque for £150 with our compliments, and would like to wish you the very best of luck with future editions of the Treacle City News.



## Milford First School





#### Special Announcement


