

On Wednesday 8th May Britain and her war-time allies are celebrating the 40th anniversary of V.E. Day. I am pleased to reproduce a Methodist comment on the patriotism that such an occasion generates:-

WHAT REAL PATRIOTISM MIGHT MEAN



Patriotism is one of the most readily exploitable of emotions, and an exploited patriotism is fissile material in today's world.

Such forms of patriotism degrade the nation which encourages them, for they are cultivating that pride which admits no criticism, which is in fact a stronghold of sin.

True patriotism may find itself getting to grips with a series of very disturbing questions.

They might include such issues as, 'Is my nation honouring its long Christian tradition by deep and sustained concern for the desperately poor nations of the world?', or 'Is my nation, which has known Christian truth for so long, one in which the weak, poor and disadvantaged have an increasing claim upon the nation's resources?', or 'Should my nation, to which the Gospel was brought countless centuries ago, foment conflict in many parts of the world by energetic and entrepreneurial marketing of arms?'

These are not the questions of those with no love of country, but of those with so profound a love of country and such joy in the best of its heritage as to agonise over a falling below the best. In this year's Christian Aid Week (May 13-18) public attention will be focussed on the Third World's millions uprooted by drought, war or oppression. On posters depicting mass flight is the the campaign slogan 'This Week Charity Begins with the Homeless'.

It is Christian Aid's hope that the recent outpouring of relief assistance to famine victims will have sharpened public interest in preventive measures of development, for in the long term homelessness is a matter for justice rather than 'charity'.

With that aim Christian Aid's 3,000 local committees are hoping to beat last year's £4.8 million Christian Aid Week total.

Some 17 million envelopes will be delivered and collected by 400,000 houseto-house collectors during the Week.

BANDAID, the specially brought together group whose single "Do They Know It's Christmas" raised more than two million pounds for Ethiopia was made up of chart topping stars Bananarama, The Boomtown Rats, Phil Collins, Culture Club, Duran Duran, Heaven 17, Marilyn, Kool & The Gang, The Police, Spandau Ballet, Status Quo, The Style Council, Ultravox, U2, Wham and Paul Young with added contributions by: David Bowie, Eurythmics, Frankie GTH, and Paul McCartney.

Creator and organiser BOB GELDOF said: "It was that particular clip where it showed you this nurse and she had to choose 300 babies from a total of 10,000, and in effect those 300 were going to be given some sort of liquids that they had in the camp, and the rest of the 10,000, well, they were going to die.

"It was this sort of random decision between life and death that really got me.
