



CHOOSE THE GODPARENTS YOUR BABY DESERVES

Don't be put off with pale imitations!

WHO TO HAVE for godparents? It's a question that many parents have agonised over. Some parents begin by trying to think of people they know who like children and who they think would take a keen interest in their child's development, others never think further than their immediate family.

Occasionally however, some parents' motives are not quite so clear and although the Victorian practice of paying godparents has died out it is still not unknown for godparents to be chosen with an eye to a possible future inheritance, or as happened in "Brideshead Revisited", when Lady Celia Ryder chose her child's godparents because of the expected size of the Christening present!

But what is a godparent? How did they originate? What are their functions and above all what criteria should we use in choosing them? The first known reference to godparents or sponsors in Christian literature is in the writings of Tertullian towards the end of the 2nd century, where he describes the job of a Baptismal Sponsor as being "to make sure that the new Christian kept his baptismal promises." A very necessary role in a society where Christians were still persecuted in a predominantly pagan society. reforms of the Nineteenth Century god-



By the Middle Ages baptism and confirmation had become separate rites in the Church and the role of godparents had expanded considerably, so much so that in the Sarum Missal we read that at a baptism the godparents had to promise that they would be responsible for the child's safety until the age of seven, and that they would bring their godchild to be confirmed by the bishop as soon as he or she had learned the Lord's Prayer, Hail Mary and the creed! There was not much change at the Reformation except that the Hail Mary was left out in favour of the Ten Commandments and that the godparents were exhorted to exercise spiritual guardianship over their charges.

BACKGROUND

With the succeeding centuries little changed, and godparents began to fade into the background and during the legal parents ceased to be the legal guardians of a child in the event of its parents' death and some of the worst abuses of the system were suppressed by the Church.

In recent years godparents have been regarded as little more than those who answer questions about the Christian Faith for a child at the Baptism Service. Little has been expected of them except that they should, in the early years at least, try to remember to send a present at Christmas and on birthdays. Godparents like that are only a pale imitation of what godparents should be. The office of godparents is important both to the child and to the church. Although no godparent can ever guarantee that their godchild will become a committed worshipping Christian who knows Jesus as Saviour and Lord, they can be a friend to the child as it grows; a friend who is prepared to talk about Jesus.


