



THE LAST BUS


A PERSONAL OPINION

Over the last ten years I have noticed that the bus service between Milford and Derby has got a lot thinner on the ground after six in the evening and has become virtually non-existent on Sundays. A friend of mine at Trent Motor Traction told me that the service has been progressively trimmed because there's little or no profit on the route. But we still have a bus service of sorts and that's a vital asset to the young and pensioners, to say nothing of the rest of us who either haven't got cars or share a car with their spouse. It's therefore a great concern to me that the Government's Transport Bill seems to be sailing unscathed through the House of Lords, having been given the nod by the Commons, including the willing support of West Derbyshire MP Mathew Parris and Belper's Phillip Oppenheim. Strange that MP's representing mainly rural constituencies should be fervent supporters of a Bill which could decimate our bus services.

No I'm not trying to alarm people, but the Bill would de-regulate buses and severely curtail the ability of Trent MT to keep a decent service running to Derby from Belper except at the busiest times. The County Council would still be able to subsidise some of the rural routes, and without that some Derbyshire villages would be virtually inaccessible. But local routes are very unlikely to be a priority because of those trains which by-pass Milford! The Bill, of course, opens the way for all manner of private operators to come zipping up and down the A6 with their second-hand buses. But if the route is already unprofitable they're hardly likely to be falling over backwards to pick up Milford and Makeney people when THEY want to travel. I think we'll see few buses on the A6 once the Transport Act starts biting, and for the rest of Derbyshire outside the big towns it will be even worse. It's about time those of us who do use buses, such as they are, started telling those MP's that they should think about their constituents and not just tow a dogmatic party line.

CHURCH COUNCIL

The Parochial Church Council will meet in the Church Room on Monday 22nd July at 7.30 pm. All are welcome to attend.

The Bishop of Derby was reported recently as speaking out strongly against Sunday trading. This is what he actually told the Diocesan Synod on 18th May:

"Church people are disturbed because this legislation (to abolish all restrictions on Sunday trading) challenges the Christian tradition of Sunday observance. This is not, however, merely a matter of making things more difficult for those who wish to attend church on Sundays to do so, important though that is....We are concerned, however, not merely with Christian believers, but with the

whole community, which needs a day of rest...in no time other related public services would have their whole routine changed. The leisure and the change of interest we have at present on Sundays is beneficial for the whole community.... People need adequate rest and holidays. Any kind of exploitation should be opposed by Christian people. To remove all restrictions from Sunday trading could lead to exploitation, and what is the point of it all? To remove some tiresome and inconsistent restrictions yes, but much more to allow certain people to make more money.

"Not so long ago the Prime Minister criticised Bishops and others for not holding in sufficient respect those who make money for the community. In my judgment it is not the making of money which is wrong, but the present distribution of money. The Christian conscience must be offended when a limited number of people have an ostentation of wealth and thousands, if not millions, have only the bare necessities of life."

I HAVE BEEN READING a book about Pilgrimage to the Holy Land ...

... written in 1857 and published in the United States in 1889 it seems to show how little life has changed. How about these descriptions of Palestine (now Southern Lebanon, Northern Israel, and the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan)?

"The various religions and sects live together, and practise their conflicting superstitions in close proximity, but the people do not coalesce into one homogeneous community, nor do they regard each other with fraternal feelings. The Sunnites excommunicate the Shiites - both hate the Druse, and all three detest the Nusairiyeh. The Maronites have no particular love for anybody, and, in turn, are disliked by all. The Greeks cannot endure the Greek Catholics - all despise the Jews....That omnific Spirit that brooded over primeval chaos can alone bring order out of such confusion, and reduce these conflicting elements to peace and concord."

"No other country in the world, I presume, has such a multiplicity of antagonistic races; and herein lies the greatest obstacle to any general and permanent amelioration and improvement in their condition, character, and prospects. They can never form one united people, never combine for any important religious or political purpose; and will therefore remain weak, incapable of self-government, and exposed to the invasions and oppressions of foreigners."

And I hope Pilgrims who travel with me are safer than this :

"Two Christians and a Turk, who ventured too far (into the River Jordan), were drownedand the wonder is that many more did not share the same fate.

This sad accident, which would have cast a shade over the whole assembly in America, produced very little sensation among the pilgrims. In fact, this pilgrimaging seems to obliterate every benevolent feeling from the heart. When we left Jerusalem, the guard immediately in front of me, in careering and curveting with his horse, fired a pistol, and shot a woman dead, and yet I never heard the affair mentioned afterward but with levity. As we came along, if any poor woman fell from her horse, and rolled down among the rocks, it called forth only loud laughter from the passing crowd."

CHRISTIAN ACTIVITY IN MIDDLE EAST

THE FIRST 'Directory of Christian Communication in the Middle East' shows an amazing variety of communication activities in a region which is normally believed to be almost entirely Moslem.

The directory, published by the Middle East Council of Churches, lists eight private Christian broadcasting stations in Lebanon alone, 3 of which belong to Armenian Orthodox lay people.

In the entire region 115 Christian periodicals are published, most of them in Arabic. The directory also lists 69 Christian book publishing houses of which 20 are located in Lebanon.



KNOWLEDGE BEFORE WITNESS

HOW IMPORTANT ISLAM is in our one world today, and how relatively few of us as Christians know anything about Islam. How important the Hindu and Buddhist traditions have been in framing the culture and shaping the thought of all Asia, and how relatively few of us have more than a passing acquaintance with these traditions. We pledge ourselves in the Ten Commandments not to bear false witness against our neighbours. But we do not know our neighbours, and how often do we bear false witness, not out of malice or out of intent to distort the face of our neighbour, but out of sheer ignorance.
